Perhaps most significantly, first with Michael Sherman and now with Alan French, helping manage this magazine for nearly ten years has enhanced my Porsche life (and hopefully yours) beyond measure. It is my plan that it will continue to do so for some years.

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What Does the Future Hold for PCA?

As the largest single-marque car club in the world, PCA experienced a record 6% growth in 2021 and now has more than 147,000 members in 147 regions throughout North America, organized into 14 zones. Twice a year, Zone 2 (our zone) holds a President's Meeting to discuss PCA National Strategy and to allow leadership from the 10 regions covering the Mid-Atlantic Area to discuss club activities and issues. It's a great way to get the pulse of the club on both a national and a regional level. Here are some highlights presented earlier this year by Aaron Ambrosino, PCA National Vice President.

PCA strategic initiatives include increasing marketing, engagement and impact across the regions, with a focus on four-door Porsche owners and PCA Juniors.

PCA wants to maintain the highest standards for PCA Media and

continue to improve the technical resources for members, as well as maintaining leadership in Porsche performance driving, e.g., in Club Racing, Drivers' Education, Autocross, and PCA Sim Racing.

In the regions, more coaching and leadership training will be available.

But PCA is also looking ahead to 2030, when 70% of all Porsches will have lithium-ion batteries, and is proactively addressing logistical and safety challenges for EVs on the racetrack, considering activities tailored for EV owners, and discussing the lack of charging stations now and the lack of access to petroleum-based fuel in the future.

PCA anticipates that by 2030, more members will prefer a digital experience, and is looking for ways to increase virtual engagement (i.e., YouTube, Sim Racing).

According to membership trends, PCA will grow to 200,000 total members by 2030, which may cause some regions to split to better provide activities to local members.

National events must continue to evolve and innovate, and PCA will continue to experiment with events such as ÜnSTOCK, a new car show for modified Porsches. New activities will bear new costs, which will mean increased registration fees and the need for more National professional staff.

One constant is what all regions in Zone 2 and across PCA share: We are fueled by volunteers and depend on members who contribute their time and expertise to our programs. We have a wealth of adventures ahead. Please join us in our journey! Contact president@pcapotomac.org to learn more about getting involved with the club! DV

If you ever doubted how much tires affect your car's handling while driving, you need to come out to the next "Watercross." A waterlogged Autocross Event #2 gave drivers a fantastic feel for how their cars performed in the wet. The original course event had to be redesigned in certain areas to avoid extra slick spots. (Safety is always our top priority.) With the event as safe as we could make it, we set out to have some fun driving in slippery conditions.

Duyane N. pulled FTD (fastest time of the day) in his 911 996 with

a 50.858 second run. His win shows what a fantastic driver he is, along with what a great rain car the 996 is, even on the summer tires Duyane used.

Juliana W. drove her father's 2012 Turbo S. She tore through the crowded ranks of the S5 class with AWD, all season tires, and a fantastic coach, John Bendekovic. At 17 years old, during her second ever Autocross event, Juliana took first place in S5.

Juliana's father, Ken, said later that he tried unsuccessfully to convince his wife to join him at Autocross. His son previously expressed interest but hasn't made it to an event. Once she was able to participate, Juliana jumped at the chance. As someone also in the S5 class, I am excited to see Juliana's progress.

Gary Baker rode with me in our 2016 GT4 during the first two of my runs. He got kicked out after the second run because he started trying to coach me. Mr. "Add-More-Gas!" didn't realize how slick it was until he did his runs later.

I then rode with Gary during his first run. He did a lot of sliding. The only words I spoke while I rode with him were, "HA!" "See?" and, "I told you so."

I got kicked out after the first run.

This is a good time to remind you that you can always ask for a ride along with a coach to help familiarize yourself with the course. You can ask for a ride along before, during, or after your heat. (That also applies to other coaches.) It's fun to ride along with others. It helps you pick up on techniques you may not have considered.

My final thoughts for Watercross involve the value of experiencing a spin in your car. I've mentioned this before. It's incredibly informative in dry conditions to know just how much grip you have. This is doubly true in the rain. Some people cancel their registration if the weather is anything but sunny. I implore you to attend an Autocross no matter the weather.

Your Porsche is a wonderfully engineered piece of machinery. Autocross helps to teach you not only the limits of your Porsche, but what you can do to affect those limits. Tires matter – a lot. You can have plenty of tread on your tires, but if they're old they won't have as much grip in dry conditions compared to new rubber. A good set of summer tires feels great on back roads or maybe a run through Skyline Drive, but might get you in trouble on the way back if you run into stormy weather. Tire pressure can affect handling in the dry or the wet. Autocross teaches you more than you ever knew you should know about your car.

Come to Autocross to learn about your Porsche's capabilities, compete with your friends in a fun and safe environment, and set the stage for success wherever you drive next. **DV**

Mid-May found many of us in PCA Potomac DE driving the roads to Watkins Glen, New York. This is the second year we have had the pleasure of being at this amazing track in spring rather than our later usual slot in the summer, and it seems to be a terrific time to be in the Finger Lakes Region. The track was in great shape as usual, the weather was great with rain only intermittently on the last day, and the event – including a well-attended track drive / walk on Friday evening – went off without a hitch.

For those of you who have not been to Watkins Glen International, it is a truly iconic grand-prix-level track located near the southern tip of Lake Seneca. This track has been the site

of every type of car racing possible, including IndyCar, IMSA, NASCAR, SCCA, Vintage, and in the past, Formula 1. The area first gave enthusiasts a race course in 1948, when cars ran on 6.6 miles of local public roads; then a permanent dedicated course was developed and built in 1956.

Obviously, it has changed markedly over the decades and now is owned and managed by NASCAR. The present full circuit which we used for our DE is 3.377 miles with 11 turns, including "the boot." The NASCAR short course is formed by bypassing "the boot," resulting in a 2.45 mile 7-turn circuit.

There really is nothing like the long "climbing esses" at the Glen, or the long swooping outer loop leading down into the

"boot" segment of the track. You should strongly consider coming with us next year, and maybe grabbing an extra day to visit the vineyards or hike through the beautiful trails in the area. Once you come, you will return, we guarantee it!

This year, we had 161 drivers split among five run groups from beginning Green through advanced Red. We were able to successfully promote 17 drivers to a higher group during this event. Hope to see you at Summit Point, WV for one or more of our upcoming events. See the PCA Potomac website for more information on the Driver Education Program. DV

The 38th Annual Deutsche Marque Concours d'Elegance

On Sunday, May 1, 2022, the 38th Annual Deutsche-Marque was held at Occoquan Regional Park. As in the past, Porsche cars on the field vastly outnumbered BMWs and Mercedes. Despite some last-minute angst concerning possible foul weather, a substantial crowd of visitors and exhibitors appeared for the event. Indeed, there were more cars and many more spectators than at the last Concours in September, 2021. Because we were able to persevere on this less than sunny day, we were able to complete all our judging and awards before the heavens unloaded with the rain that everyone feared would cancel the Concours. And the Pavilion roof provided just enough cover when we needed it so that only the cars got soaked, not us.

Forty-eight registered cars appeared with a few additional last minute entries, with about half each for display only and

to be judged. As always, all cars arrived spotless, representing an excellent cross section of the brand. Indeed, this year we even had a big red Porsche diesel tractor, which appeared courtesy of Sal Fanelli, who was awarded the original "One of a Kind" trophy. Sal had to bring his 318 (3 cylinder) Master when a part for his 418 (4 cylinder) did not arrive in time. This certainly gives a different perspective to ownership of multiple Porsches!

While we did not convince any Taycan owners to participate this year, we did have a full complement of all of the 11 other car categories, with some very special cars. While the awards are listed below with their owners and cars, the Best of Marque winner was an immaculate car with a gorgeous, if not flawless, re-paint job: a 1969 911E in Bahama yellow, as fully restored by Greg Schebish. Greg also was the winner

with this car for the early air cooled (1964-1976) category, so he left with his hands full of trophies.

Other multiple winners included Pete Russell and his silver 1962 356B for both the 356 class and the Chairman's Award. Pete is the original owner of this car, which is approaching 300,000 miles on the clock – but you would never know it by looking at it (or Pete)! Bob Gutjahr and Ellen Beck were also multiple winners for their 1980 911SC in Byzantine gold metallic in the mid air-cooled category (1977-1989) and as the Most Significant Porsche award. Bob and Ellen were also gracious enough to act as 22% of our judging staff for the day. Our complete judging crew, under the able direction of John Truban, former Concours Chair, included Barry Deuel, Donna Brandt, George Mrad, Tarek Shamounki, Lewis Hauser,

Adrian Kessler and Darryl Nichols. We thank them for their efforts, because without their expertise, there would be no Concours – and for John's comedic relief that brightened our spirits on a cloudy day.

Our next "Concours" will be the Fun Concours at the annual picnic in October so watch for registration. While this will not involve the super clean car presentation of the Deutsche-Marque weekend, it will be one with completely humorous categories and is always a big draw. While not strictly a "concours" event, we will be having a highly curated show of cars as part of the festivities at PorscheFest on July 30, 2022 at Summit Point. Those cars that won their categories at the Deutsche-Marque, plus Grand Award winners, are invited to participate.

Also this year, for the low price of \$1 you can get a "Taste of Autocross" by riding along with an experienced instructor!

But wait – There's more! Drive and Dine will have an event that ends at the track; we will have a car display from the Concours crew; and we will have a diecast car vendor. Wrapping up the day will be Charity Laps on the main circuit, and finally our big social hour and dinner under the big tent.

Potomac HPDE Instructor Program

Those of us who have been part of PCA Potomac's instructor corps believe that it has developed into an incredibly strong gem of a program. This has been achieved not through random luck and serendipity, but rather from focused and directed thought, assessment, and activity. Our chief instructors have carefully formed a group of individuals with similar goals and standards in our interactions with students, gradually and with increasing focus on how and what to communicate to our student drivers by assessing what works and what doesn't. Reinforcement of these ideas and approaches happens by communication between students and instructors, and ongoing surveillance by the chief instructors of how things are going during and after our events.

As a cornerstone of this program, we devote a lot of thought and work to identify advanced drivers who might become instructors. Our instructor development team, led by Jay Smith and our chief instructors, has developed a process of mentoring these folks. This includes discussing this option with them and using a fairly lengthy time during the season to gradually provide instruction on how to instruct. These instructor candidates spend time at multiple events talking to experienced instructors who help the candidates to develop the skill set needed to instruct from the right seat. This process includes extensive exposure to right-seat ride-alongs and trial instruction to the experienced instructors, who can catch what might need help and fine tune what is

right. Communication on how these candidates progress and the support they need is ongoing through the season. This yields a group of instructor candidates ready to be tested against criteria developed by PCA National. The "National Instructor Day" usually happens at our first DE (Drivers' Education) of the season, and through this day, the final candidates are provided a last round of classroom instruction and testing on what they have learned and how they are able to perform during in-car instruction. Once they pass this testing day, they will be given a National Instructor Number from PCA National, and they will be seen in student cars with communicators and big smiles.

Frequently asked questions about our instructor program:

Why become an instructor? There are several reasons. First, many of us enjoy sharing our love of this sport with others. It is very rewarding to work with a driver on the track and see him or her understand and feel what we teach. These students often become friends and grow the community that we all enjoy at the track events and beyond. Next, most of us feel a need to pay back into the system that taught us and provided us with so many fun-filled hours and days. The DE community cannot exist without growing and evolving, and it is exciting to be part of this.

What makes a good instructor? This is a judgment call, but I would say that the instructor must have advanced driving skills and, equally important, good communication

There are skilled performance drivers, and there are skilled educators, but a good DE Instructor has significant competence in both. As a DE student, I see in the paddock, and the right seat of my car, those who have an innate ability, that started teaching their friends how to go faster in a pedal car at kindergarten. But it's more complicated than that...

Imagine being asked to coach someone around a track from a pool of timid to aggressive drivers, that have different learning styles, with cars from an ever-increasing gamut of Porsches (and other marques), including vintage marvels, 2022 rocket ships, EV's, and race cars! Could you drive a car safely from the right-seat using words and hand signals alone?

Clearly, natural ability helps, but to build an instructor corps that can support the huge variety of demands requires an excellent development program.

For the past couple of months, instructors have shared generously with me, their thoughts and experiences. My appreciation of their role and capabilities has grown considerably. There are no secret handshakes required to get these insights – you just need to ask.

Here are just three insights that demonstrate the complexities and capabilities of our instructor corps:

Matching student with instructor – this is not an automated process. It is NOT random. The Chief Instructors spend time matching the needs of the student with the capabilities of the instructors at the event. Considerations include the platform, i.e., Cayman/Boxster/911, vintage/modern, road/race car. Gender – some students express a preference, and special skill requirements like languages, including sign-language for deaf students, and race skills for those who want to go and Club Race.

Communication – your instructor selects the right language at the right cadence (what & when on track you need it). Consider a sequence of turns that you navigate in say, 20 seconds – your instructor must use the most efficient and effective words (and/ or hand signals) at just the right time. One anecdote shared by Kurt Leta, from a session he had with Bill Calcagno, included the line “I don't use the word, great! If you think you heard me say it, I actually said BRAKE!”.

Observation – communication includes non-verbal behaviors. Instructors diagnose issues and opportunities from the feel of the car, and the observation of student inputs to the car to provide corrective coaching. For example, why did the car slide? Why is the car not slowing fastest enough? Why did the traction control engage?

Henry Ford said, “Anyone who stops learning is old, whether at twenty or eighty. Anyone who keeps learning stays young.”

I thank our instructors for reigniting a passion, sharing their skills, knowledge, and experience, and keeping me young! DV

skills. You need to know how to be firm but have a good time. It always helps if you can get your student to smile on the track. Time in the seat is important to build the skill set to recognize what the car and student are doing to both identify and to correct an issue. This does not mean the instructor needs to be a club racer; it means experience and time in the seat are key.

How is Potomac PCA different? The main difference in our program is the long learning time during which the instructor candidate is mentored, observed, and coached until the testing day. Most clubs do not provide this amount of time and commitment to get new instructors ready and able to instruct. We pay a lot of attention to feedback from students and work with our established instructor corps to keep current and to identify any areas in which we all can improve.

Why do we need more instructors? Note all the above answers! The club is always growing and changing with new people coming and others leaving. New energy and enthusiasm are always a benefit, especially in something as energetic as in-car instructing. We have quite a few track events each season, and even the most obsessed and committed among our established instructor corps cannot make it to every event. Life interferes. And, the more the merrier. DV
